Thank you so much for your support towards scholarships which continue to make a transformative difference to the lives of so many students here at the University of Leeds.

In this report you will see the impact of your generosity and how you are ensuring that students from less advantaged backgrounds can thrive in their studies and through their extra-curricular activities. Much of this is told through the testimony of the students themselves, such as Farah Mahmoud, second year Criminal Justice and Criminology:

"My scholarship means that I can live comfortably, in a safe area and eat plenty of nutritious food. It allows me to pay the training fees for the Trampoline Society which helps me to keep fit. My scholarship helps me to get the full university experience in the sense that I rarely have to say no to plans or socials for financial reasons."

Students from less advantaged backgrounds stand to gain the most from higher education, and with your help we are able to sustain our support to deserving and talented people. This year 207 students started at Leeds with the financial security offered by a scholarship. One of the great challenges for education is to be more accessible, and your support is allowing us to take a lead role in recruiting students from less advantaged backgrounds. These students may be the first in their family to come to university, may come from communities where participation in higher education is low, or may have been in care or have caring responsibilities.

Since joining the University I have been impressed by the Leeds community – through the ambition shown by the students I meet and the generosity of our alumni. I can see how much the University means to our community by the fact that so many supporters, like yourself, wish to ensure that future generations can enjoy this special Leeds experience. Whilst this academic year saw face-to-face teaching return and campus felt much more lively and vibrant, our students were still facing an education environment that was affected by Covid-19. But having their scholarship has allowed many to navigate through these difficult times. And we were delighted that in March we were able to welcome back graduates from the Classes of 2020 and 2021 for a celebration of their graduation – you can read more about this on page 15.

Thank you for your generous support for scholarships. These scholarship recipients provide richness, cultural diversity and intellectual gifts to our University community which would be far less rounded without them, and in turn they will join our growing alumni community too. Thank you so much for all you do as a donor and supporter of the University of Leeds.

I feel that these words, from final year Biochemistry student Richa George, sum up the difference you are making:

"These scholarships are truly life changing; I would have been a very different person today if I hadn't received my scholarship as I might not have even come to university. I've been blessed with so many incredible opportunities that I wouldn't have had if I was anywhere else, and it wouldn't have been possible without your support. 

I grew up in foster care from the age of eight. I am the first in my family to go to university, as well as one of only a handful of students from my secondary school to attend a Russell Group university.

Researching universities, I was very concerned about how I could afford it – my rent would cost more than half of the maintenance loan and without family help I didn't believe I would be able to afford a lot of the equipment needed for my studies.

My scholarship means I don't have to tell people, "no, I can't afford it," it means I can get involved in lots of activities and has helped me to make lots of new friends.

Abigail Wood First year Economics It was a big weight off my shoulders to find out I'd been awarded the scholarship and it definitely made me more excited about the move to university. My scholarship means I have been able to buy books for my course, it aids my travel expenses to and from the campus and it also helps me to afford academic subscription services.

Through being a scholarship recipient, I've engaged with the Plus Programme which has given me many opportunities outside of university. For example, I worked with a charity to give talks to groups of foster carers on how they can encourage their foster children to pursue university, and I have also been working with researchers to improve the support that is provided for children in foster care.

Thank you very much for supporting scholarships at Leeds. Scholarships allow young people from less advantaged backgrounds to feel more confident in pursuing university, by helping to provide resources that we cannot get from others.

Only 6% of care-leavers pursue university, and often this is due to a lack of funding support. As a care leaver, my scholarship gives me confidence that I can afford everything I need to succeed here at Leeds. Thank you.

First year Social Work

When I got the email to say that I had been awarded my scholarship it was such an enormous relief, especially with prices increasing and being a sole provider trying to run a home, a car and provide for my son. This scholarship has made a huge difference in mine and my son's life. Money was extremely tight and I struggled to afford food for the month after I had paid my bills, but now that I don't sit up worrying about what my son is going to eat for the next two weeks, I can focus on my education.

My scholarship helps me pay for childcare so that I can attend events run by the Social Work Society, and also meet with my peers for study sessions. I have made some lifelong friends on this course and we are now comfortable enough to chat and meet up outside of university which is important for my wellbeing too.

I wanted to study Social Work as I have seen for myself the support and encouragement that Social Services have provided to a relative of mine who struggled with their family. In a few years' time, when I graduate, I'm excited about diving into a sector that I am passionate about – I want to work with young offenders as I want to make a difference to young peoples' lives.

I am extremely grateful I was awarded this scholarship and I hope one day when I am qualified, I can help someone else like me too.

My scholarship has meant that I don't feel like such a misfit, that I'm not missing out on lots of things, and that I can enjoy university and not always stress about money. I feel very lucky – thank you.



I was more comfortable at college; I came out as LGBTQ+ and received better disability support. I began to thrive and reached my potential for the first time – I achieved high grades and was the first in my class. My academic excellence continued throughout my undergraduate degree and I won several academic awards and prizes including an international prize, the prize for the best overall performance in my undergraduate studies and the prize for the best dissertation on a medieval topic. These experiences have instilled in me a strong work ethic and appreciation for education. I utterly love my postgraduate course and the opportunities it provides.

Looking ahead to the future with optimism, I'm thrilled at the prospect of utilising the skills and expertise gained during my MA studies to pursue doctoral study at Leeds in October – and I'm delighted to say that I have a place of study confirmed!

Plus Programme

Thanks to your generosity, alongside a scholarship, we are also able to offer students from underrepresented backgrounds an enhanced package of support through the Plus Programme. For every £10,000 scholarship, £1,000 goes towards the Plus Programme which acts as a 'base camp' for all students who come from backgrounds that are less represented at university.

Second year Medicine

The Plus Programme provides weekly emails and offers unique events to create a sense of community and belonging for students. Working with the Careers Centre, the Plus Programme also offers insight days which provides students the opportunity to gain an understanding and experience of working for a range of employers. Each event enables students the opportunity to get a feel for the organisation, ask questions and better understand what is needed to pursue a career in that field.

A dedicated point of contact liaised with social workers to ease the transition to university and additional financial support provided kitchen and bedding packs to help these students settle in during arrival week.




The Clubs and Societies Fund minimises the financial barrier and helps Plus Programme students access Leeds University Union's full range of clubs and societies. Students can apply for the reimbursement of membership fees for as many clubs and societies as they like, giving them the opportunity to make the most of what Leeds has to offer.

In 2021/2022, 236 students were supported to join societies, funding more than £7,000 worth of membership fees.

Opportunities Fund

The Opportunities Fund helps students to access extracurricular, professional development experiences or noncompulsory activities which may enhance their employability. The Fund levels the playing field as students are not excluded from these opportunities due to financial constraints. Thanks to your support, the Opportunities Fund helps students to afford additional course fees, or pay travel expenses and purchase smart clothing for interviews. This extra source of funding alleviates worries, allowing students to take full advantage of the opportunities that are offered, helping them strive to reach a better future.

The Opportunities Fund allowed me to buy a stethoscope which I have been using during my placements this year.

Since I have had the stethoscope I have diagnosed a heart murmur in a six-year-old child and referred them to paediatric specialist services for further investigations. I have also picked up on an adult patient having fluid in their lungs after hearing crackled sounds through the stethoscope. This led to a chest x-ray being done and medical intervention being started.

I anticipate my stethoscope will last me a long time and is something I will continue to use in nearly all my patient interactions – thank you so much!

My scholarship allowed me to secure accommodation in Henry Price which gave me greater freedom – it was very convenient and reassuring to know I could easily access the many wonderful facilities on campus, without worrying about getting home late at night. My scholarship helped me take up every opportunity – membership of LUU Opera Society allowed me to perform in three operas and enjoy learning from professionals at Opera North. And as a founding member of LUU Music Society Symphonic Choir I even went on tour to Berlin! This would not have been possible without my scholarship.

There was always something going on at Leeds and I worked 'front of house' for shows in the School of Performance and Cultural Industries. I also loved volunteering as a Scholarships Ambassador and featuring in University communications, which allowed me to give something back and promote Leeds.
